The Energy Transition Council (ETC) is a multilateral platform, co-chaired by the United Kingdom (UK) and the Philippines, that brings together governments and institutions offering global political, financial and technical leadership in the power sector. The ETC supports partner countries to identify, coordinate and implement solutions for a faster energy transition, including with technical assistance through its Rapid Response Facility (RRF).

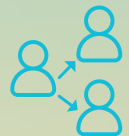

What the ETC has done so far

100s of focused strategy sessions and working groups to address and unlock specific challenges impeding the energy transition



30+ **RRF technical assistance requests** responded to, for example on energy efficiency, just transition and clean cooking, with more in the pipeline across



11 ETC countries responded to by **25+ delivery partners** resulting in significant clean energy commitments made by ETC partner countries, including through the **COP26 Global Coal to Clean Power Transition Statement** and the **COP28 Global Renewables and Energy Efficiency Pledge**



About the ETC's RRF

The RRF is the ETC's coordination mechanism for delivering technical assistance in response to requests from partner countries to remove obstacles to their energy transition.

Purposes

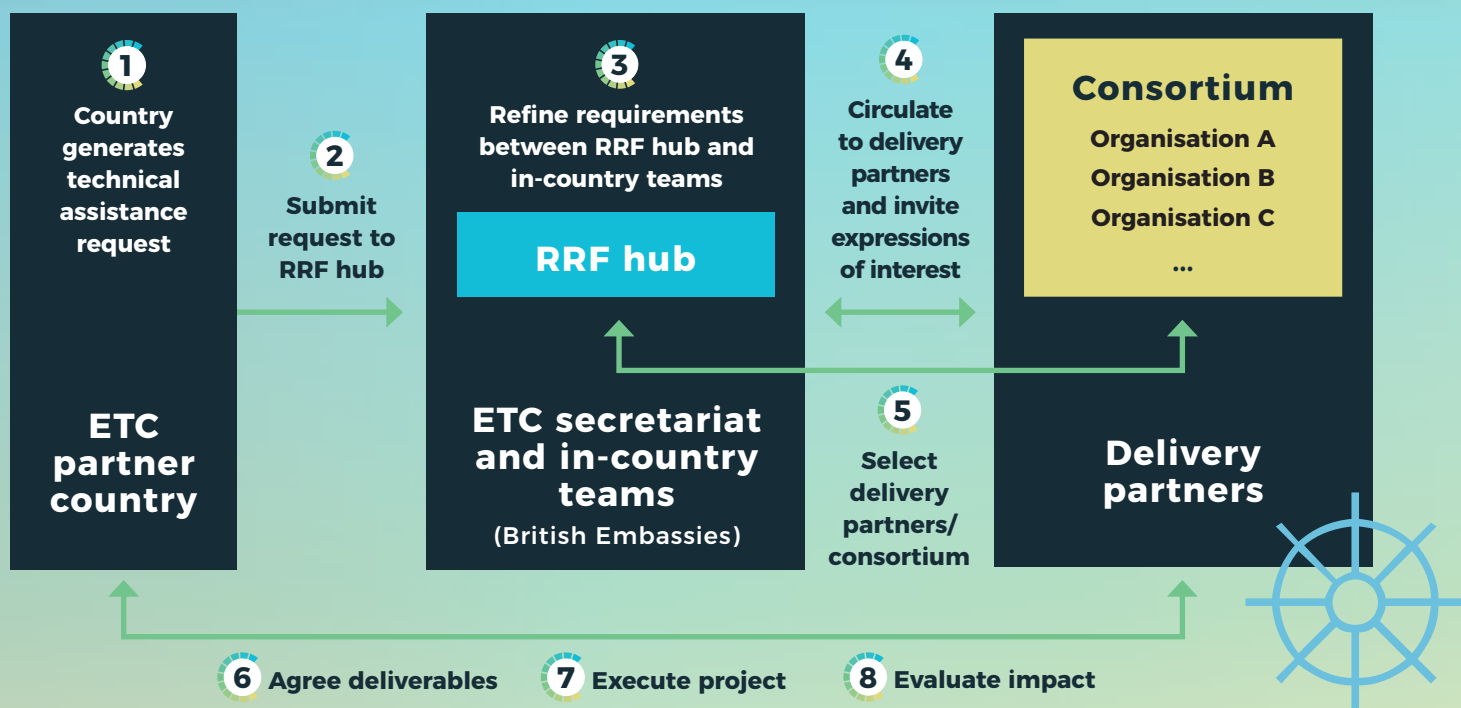
1. **Facilitates prompt responses:** Swiftly addresses needs identified in partner countries through dialogues and other forms of engagement. By aligning expertise and designated funding with these requests, delivery partners effectively provide support when and where it is most needed.
2. **Coordinates international support:** Ensures the international community responds quickly and efficiently to technical assistance requests from ETC partner countries that require substantial funding solutions. Additionally, it supports the implementation and delivery of relevant energy transition mechanisms.

Values

Demand-led, acting swiftly, open and transparent, building in-country capacity and collaborative.

How the RRF works

The RRF consists of a central unit (the 'hub') providing strategic, advisory and coordination support alongside international partners (the delivery partners). The RRF matches expertise and funds (including existing and newly mobilised funds from donor programmes, MDBs and philanthropy) with ETC partner country needs. Country requests are iterated and shared, a collaborative decision is made on how to respond to the request and, thereafter, partners deliver the project collaboratively and directly for and with beneficiaries.



ETC's offer to partner countries

1. Political Dialogues

We offer political dialogues that help raise ambitions and identify gaps in countries' energy transition at ministerial, regional, and national levels.

2. Donor and Investor Coordination

We provide practical and catalytic support, including through facilitating dialogues, and sharing strategic insights to ensure donor effectiveness.

3. RRF Technical Assistance

The RRF, the ETC's technical assistance coordination mechanism, ensures that the international community responds to country requests in a joined-up, swift and effective manner, matching requests with expertise and resources offered.

Recent ETC achievements 2023

ETC is a key implementation mechanism for the Power Breakthrough Agenda and the recent COP28 global target of tripling renewable energy and doubling energy efficiency by 2030.

9th ETC Ministerial convened, to advance unified and coordinated efforts from all stakeholders towards our global goals.

ETC announced new partnerships with the US's Net Zero World (NZW) and Clean Energy Solutions Center (CESC) initiatives, and the Climate Emergency Collaboration Group (CECG) to cooperate and share expertise, enhancing support and driving greater progress the energy transition.

ETC countries stayed focused amid global and national challenges, building momentum – e.g. the Philippines' coal moratorium, JETPs in Indonesia and Vietnam and the Africa Climate Summit hosted by Kenya – with ETC support.

ETC forged partnerships to support the extension of its mandate from 2025 to 2030, with all partners engaged in ministerial and national dialogues.
